EXECUTIVE STAFF REPORTS

October 16, 2025, Commission Hearing

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I. ENFORCEMENT DIVISION

STAFF: KENDALL L.D. BONEBRAKE, CHIEF OF ENFORCEMENT

A. Overview

During the period of September 1, 2025, through September 30, 2025, the Enforcement Division received the following complaints and referrals:

The number of complaints received by the Enforcement Division in September increased compared with the previous month. The number of referrals received by the Enforcement Division also increased.

For the month of September, more time to respond beyond the 14-day statutory period was needed for approximately 23 sworn complaints. Generally, additional time to respond was utilized in order to give respondents more time to respond to inquiries when it was requested.

Additionally, for the month of September, the Enforcement Division opened 96 cases, rejected 82 complaints and referrals, and closed a total of 84 cases including:

- 46 warning letters –statement of economic interests violations (39) and campaign violations (7)
- 20 no action closure letters: PREP completed statement of economic interests violations (13) and campaign violations (7);
- 5 no action closure letters alleging statement of economic interests violations (5);
- 10 approved stipulations from the August and September Commission meetings;
- 3 administrative terminations;

The Division had a total of 896 cases in various stages of resolution at the time of the August Monthly Report and currently has approximately 908 cases in various stages of resolution, including the 3 streamline and 1 mainline cases before the Commission as listed in the September Agenda. Net case openings since the last monthly report totaled 12.



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B. Annual Statistics

The following is a chart that details the annual statistics for enforcement complaints, referrals and cases over the past six years. The statistics show a marked increase in complaints during election years while referrals were reduced in 2024.

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E. Unexecuted Streamline Stipulations

Streamline penalty stipulations are approved by the Chief of Enforcement and reported to the Commission for discussion only before they are executed. The following streamline stipulations are presented for that purpose. After the close of the hearing, the Chief of Enforcement may execute all or any of the streamline penalty stipulations, at the Chief's discretion per Regulation 18360.3.

Since the last Monthly Report, the Enforcement Chief has not used discretion to increase the penalties for Tier Two advertising violations resulting in public confusion, under Regulation 18360.1(e)(6)(C)(ii), or to increase the penalties for Tier Two violations involving the same candidate, committee, or principal officer who has paid a Tier One penalty to the Commission or received a Warning Letter from the Commission for the same type of violation occurring within the last five years, based on the resulting public harm.

Campaign Late Filer/Reporter

In the Matter of Lisa Davis CUSD School Board 2020 and Lisa Davis; FPPC No. 21/123.

Staff: Jonathan Rivera, Commission Counsel. Lisa Davis was a successful candidate for the Capistrano Unified School District in the November 3, 2020 General Election. Lisa Davis CUSD School Board 2020 was Davis' candidate-controlled committee. The Committee and Davis failed to timely file one pre-election campaign statement, in violation of Government Code Sections 84200.5 and 84200.8 (1 count) and five 24-Hour Reports, in violation of Government Code Section 84203 (5 counts). The Committee and Davis also failed to timely report the occupation and employer of contributors on one pre-election campaign statement and expenditures on a semi-annual campaign statement, in violation of Government Code Section 84211 (2 counts). **Total Penalty: \$2,586 (Tiers One and Two).**

Statement of Economic Interests Late Filer/Reporter

In the Matter of Edrie De Los Santos; FPPC No. 25/936. Staff: Kendall L.D. Bonebrake, Chief of Enforcement and Fela Williams, Staff Services Analyst. Edrie De Los Santos, a Consultant with the City of Monterey, failed to timely file an Assuming Office and the 2024 Annual Statements of Economic Interests, in violation of Government Code Section 87300 (2 counts). Total Penalty: \$400 (Tier One).

In the Matter of John Hoadley; FPPC No. 25/942. Staff: Kendall L.D. Bonebrake, Chief of Enforcement and Amber Rodriguez, Staff Services Analyst. John Hoadley, a Member for the Sea Urchin Commission, failed to timely file an Assuming Office Statement of Economic Interests, in violation of Government Code Section 87300 (1 count). Total Penalty: \$200 (Tier One).



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II. AUDITS & ASSISTANCE DIVISION

Audits are conducted per Government Code sections 90000 - 90008 of the Political Reform Act (the Act). The Act requires full disclosure of receipts and expenditures of candidates and committees and disclosure of the finances of lobbyists. The purpose of the audits is to determine the level of compliance of the auditees with the Act. The opinions expressed in the audit report reflect the level of compliance with the Act. The FPPC is not responsible for the contents of the candidate's documents. Audit reports are then submitted to the Enforcement Division for further review.

A. Overview

The audit reports prepared by the FPPC summarize findings with respect to the filer's conformity with the disclosure and recordkeeping requirements of the Political Reform Act. Copies of audit reports are always sent to the auditees and those included in the audit report (such as the prior treasurer, current treasurer, and/or their representatives). These reports are public documents.

B. Current Period Updates

During the period September 1, 2025, to September 30, 2025, no audit reports were adopted by the Audits and Assistance Division. Currently, the team has 48 audits in progress at various stages, including fieldwork, post-fieldwork, and quality review.

In September, the Legal Division responded to the following requests for advice:

- *Telephone*: The Education unit responded to 260 requests for technical assistance via telephone.
- *Email Advice:* Political Reform Consultants and Legal Division attorneys collectively responded to 384 email requests for advice, 265 of which were responded to within 24 hours and 301 were responded to within 48 hours.
- *PRA Advice Letters:* The Legal Division received 7 advice letter requests under the Political Reform Act and completed 6.
- **Section 1090 Letters:** The Legal Division received 0 advice letter requests concerning Section 1090 and completed 4.

G. Upcoming Regulation Projects

November

Contributions Made by Electronic Transfer and Committee Use of Gift Cards – Proposed amendments to require committees contracting with payment processors to receive contributions via electronic transfer to ensure the payment processor employs specific procedures to verify the identity of the contributor, and assist in preventing impermissible contributions. The proposed regulations would also place prohibitions and limits on the use of prepaid gift cards for making contributions and expenditures. (Adoption)

January

Enforcement Penalties – Amend "streamline" regulations to clarify Enforcement's discretion to offer streamline settlements for violations that do not otherwise qualify for a reduced penalty, require the Commission to directly approve streamline fines, and consider existing inclusions and exclusion criteria. (Pre-notice)

Probable Cause Proceedings – Amend the existing PC regulation to make the process more efficient and lessen unnecessary delays in conducting probable cause proceedings. (Adoption)
